Pledge Projects

During the past two months of this Spring 2006 semester, the Sigma Nu pledge class has been actively



constructing a permanent bar located in the southeastern corner of the Sigma Nu sundeck. The project consisted of removing a portion of the preexisting bench located on top of the deck in

favor of a sturdy, L-shaped bar structure, complete with wood panels, a spacious, finished wooden countertop, and soon to be added, interior shelving, a swinging door leading to the interior of the bar, and a

permanent roof to protect the overall structure from the elements. It is also the wish of the newly initiated members to paint the bar when the weather improves.



The other component of this semester's pledge project was the refurbishing of the pool room. First, the old, flaky, shelves were sanded and then repainted. Pledges then organized all the books that were previously in the shelves by their category and height. In doing so, the room became more spacious and picturesque. The stained walls, doors, and window panels were then cleaned with soap and water using steel wool. This part of the project was the most time consuming, taking about 8 hours to complete. The pledges spent the extra time getting the ages of dirt and dust off the wood prior to putting a mixed coating of turpentine and linseed oil to protect the wood for future generations. In addition, they scrubbed the brick fireplace and polished all the Sigma Nu medallions and plaques. Recruitment Chair T.J. Johnson is in the process of cleaning an old moose head to hang above the fireplace. The dedication of the pledge class helped



achieve a refurbished pool room and also taught them about the importance of working together to maintain and improve Sigma Nu.

S.F. Date Night


